MESSAGE NOTES

"Two things I ask of You, Lord; do not refuse me before I die: Keep falsehood and lies far from me; give me neither poverty nor riches, but give me only my daily bread. Otherwise, I may have too much and disown You and say, 'Who is the Lord?' Or I may become poor and steal, and so dishonor the name of my God."

— Proverbs 30:7 – 9 (NIV)

Who has gone up to heaven and come down? Whose hands have gathered up the wind? Who has wrapped up the waters in a cloak? Who has established all the ends of the earth? What is His name, and what is the name of His son? Surely you know! — Proverbs 30:4 (NIV)

Six Things Money Can Do:

Wealth can lead to self sufficiency (Proverbs 11:28; 1 Timothy 6:6 – 10)

Those who trust in their riches will fall, but the righteous will thrive like a green leaf. — Proverbs 11:28 (NIV)

For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil. Some people, eager for money, have wandered from the faith and pierced themselves with many griefs. — 1 Timothy 6:10 (NIV)

Wealth can only go so far (Proverbs 11:4; 15:17; 22:1)

A good name is more desirable than great riches; to be esteemed is better than silver or gold. — Proverbs 22:1 (NIV)

Better a small serving of vegetables with love than a fattened calf with hatred. — Proverbs 15:17 (NIV)

Wealth can suddenly disappear (Proverbs 23:4 – 5)

Cast but a glance at riches, and they are gone, for they will surely sprout wings and fly off to the sky like an eagle. —Proverbs 23:5 (NIV)

Wealth can provide security (Proverbs 31:1 – 31)

She is clothed with strength and dignity; she can laugh at the days to come. — Proverbs 31:25 (NIV)

- Wealth can bring certain fulfillment (Proverbs 22:7; 14:20)
- Wealth can be an indication of blessing (Proverbs 8:21; 10:4; 22:4; 28:20)

The reward for humility and fear of the Lord is riches and honor and life. —Proverbs 22:4 (ESV)

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- Discussion Starter: Agur's prayer begins by him asking God for two things (v.7). If you could only ask God for two things, what would they be?
- Read Proverbs 30:8. Why do you think Agur prays for God to keep "falsehood" from him in relation to money? What are some of the ways money can lead to a lack of integrity in our world?
- Read Proverbs 30:7 and Matthew 6:11. Agur prays for God to provide his "daily bread." What is our "daily bread"? Why do you think both Jesus and Agur remind us to trust God for our "daily bread"?
- Read Proverbs 30:9. How does praying for "neither poverty nor riches" display a constant biblical tension of trusting God with our finances?
- How does trusting God with the principle of the tithe help develop a heart of joyful dependence on God and grateful celebration before Him in any season?
- Agur's prayer leaves us in a place of tension when it comes to money and does not resolve the tension. How can our finances either lead us toward God's heart or away?
- Consider the six things money can do from the Bible: it leads to self-sufficiency; it only goes so far; it can suddenly disappear; it gives security; it gives fulfillment; and it can be an indication of God's blessing. Which one of these factors is God using to catch your attention in life?
- The early church in Acts 2 changed the world for Christ not because the people were poor or rich, but because they lived wholeheartedly for Him. What is a next step of faith for you in relation to your finances?
- Read Agur's prayer in Proverbs 30:7 9. Take some time to thank God for His provision in your life and invite Him to use your finances to draw you closer to Him.
